SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 26, 2009 - 1:30 PM

Tour of Rose Island Lighthouse

Members and their guests are invited to visit Rose Island Lighthouse located in Newport harbor. We will leave Fort Adams in Newport at 1:30 PM from the ferry dock located across from the Fort Adams Visitors' Center. We will board the Jamestown Ferry for our trip to the island. There we will be taken on a tour of the historic lighthouse and grounds. We will have a meeting and refreshments under a tent. You might want to bring a lawn chair so that you can sit and enjoy the magnificent views of Newport and the harbor. We will return around 3:30 PM.

Directions: From Providence, take Rte. 95 South to Rte. 4. Right onto Rte. 138 East; cross over the Pell and Newport Bridges and exit to Newport. Take a right at the end of the exit ramp and proceed along Farewell St., then right onto America's Cup Ave. Continue through 5 stoplights, then right onto Thames St. Follow it all the way to a Shell gas station, then right onto Wellington Ave. Bear left and continue to a stop sign. Turn right onto Harrison Ave. and soon you will see a sign to Fort Adams. Continue to the end of the parking lot at Fort Adams and you will see the ferry dock. Parking is free. Cost of the trip is \$20.00, which includes the ferry both ways and the landing fee onto the island.

Presentation and Tour of the John Waterman Arnold House

Our meeting will be held at the John Waterman Arnold house, home of the Warwick Historical Society, at 25 Roger Williams Ave. in Warwick. Col. John Waterman Arnold, 4th great-grandson of Roger Williams, fought in the Revolutionary War, commanding the America militia in the skirmish against the English forces that burned down houses on Prudence Island, RI. This property was a working farm and dairy for many years. A presentation will be given by historian Henry Brown. A brief meeting will follow, after which we will proceed to Gregg's Restaurant at 1359 Post Rd., Warwick at 1:00 PM. Contact Trish Woodard-Harmon at 401-737-3142 Before April 10th for reservations. Directions to Arnold House: From Providence, take Rte. 95 South to Rte. 37 East toward Warwick. Follow to end, exiting to Post Rd. North. Right onto Atlantic Ave. just after WalMart, then right at traffic light onto Warwick Ave. Second left onto Harrison Äve., following for about 0.3 mi., then right onto Roger Williams Ave.

Directions to Gregg's: From Arnold House, head back towards Harrison Ave. and turn left. Right onto Warwick Ave., then left at traffic light onto Atlantic Ave. Left onto Post

Rd.; Gregg's is on the right just before the entrance to Rte. 37.

SATURDAY, MAY 15, 2010 - 10:00 AM

Tour of Governor Bradford House at Mount Hope Farm and Greenvale Vineyards Mount Hope Farm was first owned by Nathaniel Byfield, one of the original founders of Bristol (then part of Massachusetts). We will enjoy a tour of The Governor Bradford House at Mount Hope Farm. William Bradford (1729-1808) was a physician, lawyer, and United States Senator from Rhode Island. He was the great-great-grandson of the William Bradford who was Governor of Plymouth Colony. After the house tour we will travel a short distance to Greenvale Vineyards in Portsmouth to enjoy our self-catered picnic lunches. Greenvale is a farm that has been in the same family since 1863. Directions to Mount Hope Farm, 250 Metacom Ave., Bristol, RI: From I-95 take Exit to I-195 East toward Cape Cod. Take Exit 2 to Mass. Route 136 South. Continue to RI 136 South (Metacom Ave.) for 8 miles, and Mount Hope Farm will be on your left. Use main

entrance (red mail box).

Directions from Mount Hope Farm to Greenvale Vineyards, 582 Wapping Rd., Portsmouth, RI: Turn left at end of drive on Rt. 136 South. Continue over Mount Hope Bridge and take Route 138 South. Pass the State Police Barracks and take a left onto Sandy Point Ave. at the traffic light. Take the first right on Wapping Rd. The vineyard driveway is 0.9 miles on the left. Parking is in the circular drive at the end of the lane.

Presentation by Ranger John McNiff at Roger Williams Memorial
Our meeting will begin with an informative presentation given by Park Ranger and Honorary Lifetime Member John McNiff. JULY 9, 1975 CBS TELEVISION NETWORK CBS EVENING NEWS WITH WALTER CRONKITE

(Excerpt) (Roger Mudd substituting)

MUDD: Charles Kuralt is On The Road To '76, visiting all fifty states in this bicentennial year to weave, in his own style, the story of America. From Rhode Island, he reports on the central figure in the state's history, who gave to the nation a central idea

CHARLES KURALT: Nobody ever comes here any more. And you can see why. (Squeak of gate being opened.) It's hard to find, lost in the seedy side-streets of a big city. But if you want to see where the raucous give and take of American democracy really was born, you have to come here. In the wilderness of 1636, there was a spring on this spot, and a troublemaker named Roger Williams, kicked out of Puritan Massachusetts and fleeing for his life, stopped running here. He wanted to live in a place where you didn't have to believe what the government told you to believe. And when he considered what had brought him to this place, he knew he had a name for it Providence.

Then, as now, Rhode Island was just a little place, twenty-five miles across, but the colony put it right into its first code of laws that within these twenty-five miles, all men may walk as their consciences persuade them. That was Roger Williams' idea, a hundred and fifty years before the U.S. Constitution got around to saying the same thing.

Well, it was freely predicted the idea would lead to chaos. And it did. These old streets were soon filled with every kind of screwball, all arguing with one another.

With the steeple of the church Roger Williams founded behind him, Professor William McLaughlin of Brown University gave it to us straight.

I should have thought that the other colonies would be proud of Rhode Island for its religious diversity and---

PROF. WILLIAM McLAUGHLIN (Brown University): ---Oh, no, no, that's happened since the revolution. At the time, Rhode Island was a scandal and a disgrace. The ideal in the colonial period was to have a well ordered, well regulated community with uniformity of belief and conformity of practice. And this place was known as a rogue's island. It attracted people who couldn't get along in decent society. All the bad rubbish drained down into Rhode Island, and since we were at the bottom of New England, that seemed to make sense. Well, it was called the licentious republic. And in the period called the critical period, the Rhode Islanders were looked upon, even by the other states in the new nation, as a rather outrageous example of what happens when popular democracy goes too far.

KURALT: "Don't tread on me." It was a South Carolina flag but it was a Rhode Island sentiment. We found the flag flying outside the old Touro Synagogue. (Synagogue congregation singing in Hebrew, continuing under Kuralt's voice)

KURALT: The Jews started a congregation in Newport in 1658, and it's still here, worshipping in the oldest synagogue in America.

See, Rhode Island was a mess, but it was a democratic mess, long before the idea of democracy occurred to anybody else around here. It sounded good to the Jews. (Synagogue congregation singing concludes, followed by church bell ringing continuing under Kuralt's voice)

KURALT: It sounded good to the Baptists, too. Today, every town has a First Baptist Church. This is the first Baptist Church, with a congregation that goes straight back to 1638.

(Church congregation singing "Faith Of Our Fathers." Lyrics mostly indistinct, with orchestra accompaniment, continuing under Kuralt's voice)

KURALT: Freedom of conscience is so old in America that we've forgotten where it began. Every one of us who listens to the cantor on Friday night or sings "Faith Of Our Fathers" on Sunday morning or kneels with a rosary before a statue of the virgin Mary or who never goes to church at all ought to remember that religious liberty, the separation of church and state, the whole idea of the sovereignty of the people, started here.

The early Rhode Islander was disrespectful and disreputable, always fighting about something.

Today they've put him on a pedestal. The figure atop the capitol dome is called the independent man. He can see the whole state from up there, the first to be disrespectful and disreputable and free.

Walter Leland Cronkite, Jr. (November 4, 1916 - July 17, 2009) was an American broadcast journalist, best known as anchorman for the CBS Evening News for 19 years (1962-81). Roger Mudd was the documentary host and correspondent for The History Channel from 1995 until he retired in 2004.

Charles Kuralt (September 10, 1934 - July 4, 1997) was an award-winning American journalist. He was most widely known for his long career with CBS, first for his "On the Road" segments on The CBS Evening News with Walter Cronkite, and later as the first anchor of CBS News Sunday Morning, a position he held for fifteen years. Kuralt's "On the Road" segments were recognized twice with personal Peabody Awards. The first, awarded in 1968, cited those segments as heartwarming and "nostalgic vignettes;" in 1975, the award was for his work as a U.S. "bicentennial historian;" his work "capture[d] the individuality of the people, the dynamic growth inherent in the area, and ... the rich heritage of this great nation."[1] He shared in a third Peabody awarded to CBS News Sunday Morning. The George Foster Peabody Awards (Peabody Awards) are annual, international awards for excellence in radio and television broadcasting.
